

Text 1 What is the right pet for you?

Looking for a pet, preferably a dog, but don't know which one to get? Here are some questions you'll want to ask yourself. Picture yourself:

- What do you want a pet for? Companionship? Protection?
- What do you see yourself doing with a dog?
 Running? Going to the park with the dog and the kids? Going for long, quiet walks? Cuddling in front of the TV?
- Do you travel a lot? Would you take the pet with you? If not, who would take care of it for you?
- Is your living situation comfortable for all types of animals?
- Does anyone in your family have allergies?
 Remember that all dogs can trigger allergies, even the "hypoallergenic" ones.



Once you have answered these questions, you'll have a great idea of what type of breed you will require. In general, type is more important than size or overall appearance. Here are some extra pointers:

- Active, but friendly, less nervous breeds best suit families with children.
- Homes with small children are not ideal for breeds typically trained for protection work.
- Whatever you do, don't get a pit-bull type of dog if you want an affordable animal you can take with you everywhere.
- One last note: Plan on getting pet health insurance for your purebreds. They are pricey to keep, and vet bills may run into hundreds of dollars a year.

Text 2 Advice for a good job interview

- A job interview is not supposed to be one-sided. In order to portray yourself successfully during an interview, you have to also ask the right questions and show you've done your research into the company.
- 2 The company will ask you lots of questions, too, of course. But do interview the employer right back! After all, you are the one that might be filling this position, so you need to know if it's going to be a good fit, right?
- 3 You have to make sure, however, that the questions you ask aren't bland or give off the wrong impression. Keep in mind that employers do not appreciate if you ask about the height of the salary at this stage.
- 4 You could ask, for example: What are the main tasks I would have in this position? The answer to this will give you more insight into what the job is all about. Also, the question shows that you are interested in learning how you can start things off right.



- What personality traits does someone need to do this job well? The answer to this will tell you a lot. If they say, "You have to be creative", then you will probably be working alone most of the time. If they say, "You have to be cooperative", then it could mean the opposite.
- Do <u>you</u> like working here and why? Employers will be surprised to hear you ask them this, but their answer will give you a lot of information. A good sign is if you get a confident smile and an enthusiastic "Yes", together with an explanation as to why. If they seem uncomfortable, look away, cough, and start with, "Well....," consider it a red flag.

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Text 3 The world's saddest polar bear?



More than 800,000 people and a few celebrities are lobbying Argentina to send its last captive polar bear, which they say is depressed by its lonely existence in a less-than-ideal cage in a zoo in Mendoza, to Canada.

"We plead that you intervene on this issue and ask the officials in Mendoza who have the polar bear Arturo prisoner to accept Arturo's ...(7)... to a reserve in Canada, so he can live in suitable conditions," reads a petition which has more than 600,000 signatures. A similar petition from Greenpeace has gathered more than 200,000 signatures so far.

Polar bear experts say Arturo, who's been dubbed "the world's saddest polar bear", can be regularly seen pacing in his <u>...(8)...</u>, baring his teeth, tilting his head and rocking back and forth, all considered signs of stress in polar bears.

The petitioners point out that Arturo's last companion died in 2012 and say Argentina's warm temperatures and the zoo's comparatively small cage are ...(9)... the bear's quality of life.

For example, Arturo only has access to a shallow pool of water that is about 20 inches deep, while in Canada he would have access to a large, chilled area of water more than 60 feet deep. In addition, he would be allowed to ...(10)... with a number of other polar bears that currently live in the Canadian reserve.

But the director of the zoo in Mendoza says that they would have to put the bear to sleep for the nearly 6,000-mile journey, and that this could possibly kill him. 'We just want everyone to stop bothering the bear,' zoo director Gustavo Pronotto said in an interview. 'We must avoid all ...(11)..., like his death during the trip or upon arrival. He is old, and this trip would require many hours of anesthesia.'

Arturo is 28 years old. In the wild polar bears typically only live about 15 to 18 years. And while there are polar bears in captivity that are ...(12)... 30 years old, it's clear that Arturo is in the last few years of his life.

Still, the petition signers say they hope to convince Argentina's President Cristina Fernández de Kirchner to overrule the zoo's ...(13)... and allow Arturo to be moved to Canada.

Text 4 World dumps huge amounts of plastic into oceans

Each year about 8.8 million tons of plastic end up in the world's oceans, a quantity much larger than numbers given before. This is according to a new study that tracked garbage in the sea back to where it started.

2 That's about 10 grocery bags full of plastic garbage on every meter of coastline or beach around the world. The lead author of the new study is Jenna Jambeck, a professor at the University of Georgia. Jambeck projects that by 2025, the total amount of plastic trash in the ocean will reach 170 million tons. Most of the plastic trash is common household litter (cups, bags, packaging materials) that people dump into and near the sea.



3 "We need to wake up and see our waste," Jambeck said. "I think the problem we have has sort of surprised us in some ways, because we were not paying attention to it enough." The amount of plastic estimated going into the water is equal to how much tuna is fished per year. "It's as if we are replacing tuna with plastic," according to Jambeck.



4 Plastic waste in the water is an important worldwide issue, because it is eaten by sea life, and

causing death this way. There is also the clean-up cost and it affects tourism, Jambeck said. She stated that in reality today's numbers might even be a lot higher, because much trash may be hidden at the bottom of the ocean and in places researchers haven't found yet.

Text 5 Tigers cuddle with apes

Bogor, West Java, Indonesia

- Tigers don't usually snuggle with orangutans. The big cats are meat-eaters, after all. But when Demis and Manis, the tiger cubs, were rejected by their mother, zookeepers at Taman Safari Zoothought they might like the company of two other orphan siblings: Nia and Irma, the orangutans.
- 2 "The first time I put them together, they just played," says zookeeper Sri Suwarni. The four shared toys, wrestled, and took naps together. Then one morning, Nia began hugging Demis the tiger, and he lick-kissed her back! "That showed that he had truly accepted her and she was like a relative to him," Suwarni says.



Of course, as the tigers grew, their natural instincts started showing, ...X... Suwarni moved them into a separate exhibit. Now two other apes that Suwarni is raising have also made a new friend – a leopard cub.

Watercolor artist Shanan Campanaro redefines rooms

- 1 For as long as she can remember, Shanan Campanaro has been fascinated by water. 'I've always felt an urge to be in and around it.' About eight years ago, she started combining that fascination with her love of painting, playing around with watercolors both on and off the job as a senior designer at Express. Then, in 2012, when her marriage was on the rocks and her ex moved out, her New York apartment was left 'basically empty with a red rug and a big white wall.'
- 2 That's when she decided to give her paintings a larger-than-life touch, creating floor-to-ceiling wallpaper with huge designs to liven up the place. A year later, she was the artist behind her own collection of wallpaper. She exhibited her work at a local home-design show, where she received positive reviews from critics and reporters.
- All of Campanaro's patterns start with a painting, often inspired by something she has seen while travelling. An example of this are the tropical plant shadows she photographed endlessly during a trip to Mexico. Then she scans the finished art-work into her computer, multiplying the pretty shapes. 'Some are funky and bright, while others are calm and subtle,' she says. 'It's cool how different patterns can affect the whole feel of a room.'
- Campanaro has now expanded her company, Eskayel, to include fabric for clothes, upholstery for sofas, and rugs. But as much as she believes in wall-paper as an expression of a person's taste, she recommends clients making decisions about this with caution: 'I've found it can be a big, scary commitment, so I push people to introduce patterns into their home with fabric first, like curtains and table-cloths. Once you know what you like, you can take it to the wall.'

Text 8 From tech exec to aerialist

In 2003, Beverly Sobelman was a successful software developer in her late thirties. She was at the top of her game at Microsoft, sitting at conference tables with Bill Gates and 'managing people who managed people,' as she puts it. And then she had had enough and quit. She spent a few months teaching yoga and living off her savings, she says, 'but I didn't know what the next thing was going to be, which was a little scary.'

Done day, a rock-climbing buddy mentioned a class he had been taking in circus aerials, which is another word for midair acrobatics, such as found in Cirque du Soleil. Sobelman tried a session and she was instantly hooked. She traveled to Australia for months of training. 'My teacher was a kind old French gentleman, who liked me because I wasn't 20 anymore.'
Once back in the United States, Sobelman started performing and teaching with a small group.





By 2007, her classes were so popular, that she founded Versatile Arts, a full-time aerial studio. 'I never wanted to take the risk of starting my own business,' says Sobelman. 'But here I am. My experience has taught me that when you are willing to take a risk, you are also willing to see yourself change. I am in my fifties now and happy with my change.'

Some people might get the heebie-jeebies watching someone climb 20 meters up a silk banner to dance, spin and tumble in the air. But aerials can be done by people of all ages and abilities – at least when Sobelman is your instructor. 'If students can't manage a certain skill, I will find one they *can* do. So everyone walks out of the room feeling good,' she says.
